6. Low literacy users of the web

Jakob Nielsen's Alertbox, November 20, 2006 suggests the digital divide is not the only 'divide'. Neilsen claims the economic divide is a non-issue, but the usability and empowerment divides and alienate huge population groups who miss out on the Internet's potential.

The "digital divide" refers to the fact that certain parts of the population have substantially better opportunities to benefit from the new economy than other parts of the population. Most commentators view this in purely economic terms. However, two other types of divide will have much greater impact in the years to come.

Lower-literacy users exhibit very different reading behaviors than higher-literacy users: they plough text rather than scan it, and they miss page elements due to a narrower field of view.
