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#### 5. What's the story? The results of the Adult Literacy and Life Skills (ALLS) Survey Forum

This forum held on Tuesday Jan 29 at the CAE was a joint event sponsored by ABS, ACAL, CAE and VALBEC. The 36 people who attended heard from Dave Tout who gave an overview of the survey and the numeracy, problem solving and health literacy sections that were introduced in the 2006 survey. Chris Duncan, Director, National Centre for Education and Training Statistics, ABS spoke in more detail about the process and outcomes of the survey in relation to other countries who participated. Pramod Adhikari, Senior Research Analyst National Centre for Education and Training Statistics, ABS explained more of the statistical detail with comparisons to the results from 1996.

This is important data to be used to influence government to develop and implement policy to address the literacy and numeracy levels of a large proportion of the Australian population. For more information and to download a summary of findings
