




REFOCUS: Learner Centred Practices



Keynote Speaker Trace Ollis

Tracey (Trace) Ollis is an Associate Professor, Adult, Vocational and Applied Learning at Deakin University in the School of Education and is recognised as a leading researcher in adult education and has published widely in Australia and Internationally. Her research involves epistemological, ontological and ethical understandings of practice and how this relates to adult learners. She has deployed case study and multiple case study methodologies in various adult and vocational learning research projects; her research explores adult learning in formal, nonformal and informal settings. This research aims to improve understanding of what motivates and engages adult learners and how this is influenced by contexts, such as Adult Education workplace settings and more informal Adult & Community Education (ACE) and community environments. She has conducted research projects on Adult Education in human rights settings, VET, and ACE, focusing on lifelong learning. She is the Principal Editor of the Australian Journal of Adult Learning, Australia's leading journal on adult learning. Associate Professor Ollis is an award-winning teacher and researcher.

Serena Seah

The employment journeys of successful students inspires current students

This session talks about a project to develop digital resources to provide employment exposure to students. It gives you ideas of how to tap into the successful experiences of your past students to develop videos, posters for use as teaching resources in your classroom. These resources can be tweaked to cater to different student levels. What does team teaching mean for LLN in different Vocational Education contexts?

Team teaching in Australian post-secondary vocational education is an underresearched area. After reading Stephen Black and Keiko Yasukawa's 2013 article 'Beyond deficit models for integrating language, literacy and numeracy in Australian VET' Elizabeth was prompted to find out where we're up to ten years later. This workshop invites participants to explore the notion of team teaching from an adult literacy, numeracy and basic education perspective. Can team teaching enhance LLN in VET? Can it improve student learning outcomes? If so, what are good team teaching models? Elizabeth will share insights from her exploration into VET teachers and LLN practitioners views of team teaching at RMIT's College of Vocational Education. Participants will then be invited to share their knowledge and experience of team teaching. It is envisioned that this workshop will contribute to a strengthening of the discourse and community of practice around 'team teaching' in Victorian postsecondary education.



Rory Caddis

A new model of delivering Learning Support in TAFE: meeting the student at every level

During this presentation, we will introduce a new learning support model designed to meet the diverse needs of students at The Gordon. We will discuss how we have restructured the role of learning support staff to serve our students better. Our new approach involves a tiered service model that ensures all students receive the necessary support, regardless of their level of need. Additionally, we will present a new digital learning platform that we have developed as part of our Learning Support delivery. We will share our experiences implementing this model over the past two years, including the benefits and challenges encountered during the process. We will also provide insights into how this model can be adapted to suit other institutions. By the end of the session, attendees will have gained a deeper understanding of how a tiered service model can effectively provide learning support to all students.



Karen Dymke

It's a No Brainer - Research on how the Brain Learns Best

In this fun and interactive workshop Karen will present some fun facts about memory, attention spans and digital dementia. She will also present ideas for your learners about how to extend their focus, attention spans and get off their phones!



Natalie Nawrocki & Abraham Dunovits English Tactics

English tactics is a play on the term tactics. A tactic is carefully planned to achieve a specific end and in this instance the tactic is learning through tactile application. This workshop examines how tactile learning can be applied in an adult English class and how learners can enhance and consolidate their language learning. Learners are varied and learn through a variety of intelligences. One of the intelligences is kinaesthetic learning. Participants will revise the advantages of applying kinaesthetic learning in their class and how to apply this. Participants will be introduced to body movements to help learn the alphabet. in addition instructions will be provided orally on making a pliable dough in groups. The dough will be distributed and used to manipulate and used for extending and consolidating vocabulary. Extended activities will also be available to participants to further enhance literacy and numeracy skills. This workshop is for those who currently teach adults in EAL. It is particularly useful to those who teach prelit levels.



Ruth Ryan

Students in the Centre - AI in the EAL Classroom

Ruth Ryan is an EAL educator and has taught EAL overseas and in Australia for about 25 years. She has been teaching youth classes at Chisholm Institute in Melbourne's South East for a number of years and has taught adults and youth from initial to advanced levels. She believes that, in order for students to learn, classroom topics must be current, relevant and engaging, and students must be supported to get involved in activities, to work with classmates and to take ownership of their learning. Always an early adopter of technology in the classroom, she is keen on creative ideas that improve student interest, engagement and language outcomes. When ChatGPT, became big news earlier this year, and with the rise and rise of AI generally, she went to work thinking about its use in the classroom. She is interested to see what teachers might do with it in the classroom and to consider how it can empower students in their learning while also being aware of its shortcomings and its possible misuses.
