1. VALBEC Regional forum • Innovative use of digital literacies in a community based history project Thursday 25 November 3.00 pm - 5.00 pm

The Gordon, Geelong City campus, Library General Education room

To address the low levels of literacy within the Mount Evelyn community, Morrisons established a program that used football and netball as a 'hook' to engage participants. In this presentation Kerrin Pryor will describe how 27 participants built on their own strengths and passions to create a digital living history of the local football and netball clubs, while enhancing their own employability. The project was inspired by the Tynecastle Initiative set up by Edinburgh's Adult Learning Project that followed Paulo Freire's principles of focusing on dialogue and the experiences of the participants. To successfully engage learners Morrisons took the program to their learners' turf, holding sessions after training or around game time.

A great thing about this program was its use of digital technology to capture learners' attention and build their employability skills. Not only did learners improve their literacy skills through the program but they also increased their community awareness through its focus on the history of their sports clubs. A benefit of the program has been bringing together people of all ages through a shared passion and learning goal. Kerrin Pryor, the Project Manager has worked in Adult Literacy for over twenty years and on numerous projects including Integrating New Literacies into Classroom Practice. She now works as Education Coordinator at Morrisons.

Morrisons is a long established and largest adult education provider in the eastern region of Melbourne. Their programs have successfully helped people with low literacy levels engage in learning and connect with their community.
